The Engagement Process

THE COMMUNITY IS NOT ANTI-DEVELOPMENT AND HAS ACTIVELY SOUGHT TO WORK COLLABORATIVELY WITH THE COUNCIL AND DEVELOPERS.

EXTRACTS FROM MEETING MINUTES - here are some of their responses to us:

- There had not been a participatory design process because the scheme had come to them as a package. Bronwyn Thomas, Pollard Thomas Edwards Architects, 7th November 2016
- ...he had no idea where to go from here and ... he needed to go back and consider the matter. His initial thoughts were that a way to resolve the issues could not be found. Steve Burton, SherryGreen, 7th November 2016
- He did not see how it was possible to make wholesale changes without scrapping the plans and starting again. They

- It is fairly standard to have minor infringements of the BRE guidelines in inner city developments. ... the planners in Lewisham had said that they were happy to allow some infringements. *Bronwyn Thomas, Pollard Thomas Edwards Architects,7th November 2016*
- ... at an earlier meeting with Rachael George and the planners, itwas made clear to them that the wish of the community was to retain the Garden but the Council subsequently made a U-turn on the policy of allying the Garden's continued existence to the relocated Tidemills School. *Tidemill Wild Garden representatives, 7th November 2016*
- Their team was satisfying the town planners' and developers' brief, without satisfying everyone else. Bronwyn Thomas, 7th November 2017
- We have done a number of other green spaces for Deptford and know what the people of Deptford need. Mehron Kirk, landscape architect, BDP, 27th February 2017
- It would be useful if the community would be prepared to maintain and build the areas, as that will affect the service charges. *Phil Church, Family Mosaic, 27th February 2017*

The Garden

Meanwhile/temporary use misrepresented in the application

- The garden was created in the 1990s by the Deptford Discovery Team working with Groundwork UK & Mowlems in consultation with the School and the community.
- It was created from the pre-existing school playing field/garden
- Council maps have historically designated it brownfield land, but it has been a public green and open space for decades.
- Designation is fluid. There are precedents of temporary spaces changing designation.
- It received the support of Lewisham Council and Mayor Dave Sullivan opened the Garden.
- An application to make the Garden an Asset of Community Value in August 2016 was rejected

"It is not realistic to think that there can continue to be a main use of the land which will further the social well-being or social interests of the local community."

"The reason that the long-term use was not deemed realistic was because the site was allocated for development."

The garden is open to the public

- Since the 1990s the Garden has been used by the School, the general public, the wider community, local organisations and businesses

THE OPEN GREEN SPACES OFFERED ARE TOTALLY INAPPROPRIATE, INADEQUATE AND INSULTING TO THE COMMUNITY

There will be a net loss of approximately two thirds of wildlife nature garden in the current plans for Deptford. Across Lewisham boroughs there will be a deficiency of 63.45


